









• <u>COMMODORE'S REPORT</u>

Club Marquee

With the club's membership growing at the current rate, it has become necessary to have some shelter against the weather at our outdoor meetings or BBQ's. This has been achieved by the donation of a marquee from Geoff and Maureen Bollins after our last trip to Gosford, but we have found it to be too small to fulfill our needs, if a lot of members turn up and the weather deteriorates to rain. The decision was made at our committee meeting to buy a second marquee and try to join them together to double our undercover area to 6m x 6m.

This was also achieved and our first use of our double marquee was the Valentine's Day dinner in the park. It was showery all day but as the night approached, it turned into very heavy rain. The marquees passed the test with flying colours, and we were able to provide sit down spaces for thirty people who enjoyed the night immensely.

To help with the transportation of our marquees Di has offered to make a number of kit bags to spread out the load, and they are colour coded so the parts don't become mixed. Di has made a beautiful job of these and deserves a big round of thanks for such a professional job. We look forward to using them at any outing that requires shelter from the sun or rain, as well as a saving of over \$500.00 hiring costs at the Christmas Party each year.

Ferry update

In past issues I have made mention of the Berowra Waters vehicle ferry, and the problems associated with crossing it by boat. These have been few since the RTA took over responsibility of its running and safety, but there has been one incident that I should relate to you.

As my boat is moored close to the ferry and I spend a lot of time aboard, I see most of the incidents that occur over a weekend. This particular incident started with the ferry leaving the Western shore with a full load of cars and some pedestrians, as the ferry reached the center of the river I noticed two kayaks with experienced paddlers in them trying to cross the rising cables just off the eastern ramp. The ferry driver blasted the horn several times to alert them of the problem, and also took the ferry out of gear to drop the cables to prevent a dangerous situation from getting worse. Good move, I was puzzled to see the two kayaks completely ignore the problem and deliberately continue to paddle forward and raise their rudders in case they hit the cables. Attempting to cross rising ferry cables is very irresponsible, and I was thinking how professionally the ferry driver had acted, until I saw him engage forward gear and accelerate in an attempt to lift the cables, to trap or overturn the kayaks. The male kayaker was lifted out of the water by the rising cable and slid off and onto the safe side and continued on his way. All of this was done without a second look back or any acknowledgement of what just happened. I feel for the ferry drivers in these incidents, but his actions were totally unacceptable, and very dangerous. Unless the ferry drivers change their mindset in dealing with boats trying to cross the cables with an oncoming ferry, there will be a major accident with possible injuries to persons, so please give the ferry a fair go, he has right of way.
