HOW TO SUCCESSFULLY FALL OFF A WHARF


• KEEPING US UP TO DATE



JANUARY 13th 2FM. Winner of the raffle prize was Roland Schmidt. Congratulations to Roland. There were 35 members & guests in attendance.





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GLENNO'S TIPS

VARNISHING

A better way to fill small cracks and ute epoxy glue with timber sanding dust. collect the dust on a clean piece of plastic Remember to be quick as you only have



holes before varnishing is to use 5 min-When sanding the item to be varnished or paper. Mix it in until it is very stiff. 5 minutes working time. The colour

won't match exactly, but it will match better than an off the shelf polyester wood filler and will be far more durable. Another tip is to ensure that you only sand in the direction of the grain taking extra care at miter joins. The difference is really noticeable.

When applying varnish, start with the first coat (starting with the sixth coat never works) thinned down by up to 50%. This will allow the varnish to soak right into the wood and give the timber not only a deep sheen but will also give better durability. Subsequent coats need only be thinned 10-15% I always use a little wood stain in the varnish as it helps give the timber a consistent hue and hides a multitude of sins. Sanding between coats can be done with a fine sand paper but I prefer to use steel wool or a fine stainless kitchen scourer. Depending whether the varnish is inside or outside 5-7 coats is normally enough. Remember to only brush in the direction of the grain as this minimizes the appearance of brush marks. Happy painting.

A POINT TO REMEMBER, IF YOU DON'T HAVE THE TIME OR MONEY TO DO A JOB RIGHT IN THE FIRST PLACE. HOW WILL YOU HAVE THE TIME OR MONEY TO REPAIR IT.

I don't know about anyone else but over the last couple of years I've had three "D" shackles nicked from my trailer. Purely by accident I discovered that if you put a padlock through the same link as the shackle it can't be removed from the link. Of course they can then nick the chain or undo the winch or take the whole bloody trailer but at least you can be happy in the thought that they can't use the "D" shackle.
