Eti who helped with everything and anything with great enthusiasm, and to everyone else that helped to make a great night.



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"River History"

Hawkesbury River Rail Bridges:

Before the construction of the first railway bridge in 1889, people and goods were ferried across the Hawkesbury **River by a paddle steamer named "General Gordon" which carried them out into Broken Bay and up Brisbane** Water to Gosford where they could board trains heading north.

The first railway bridge was constructed by the Union Bridge Company of Brooklyn, New York and was opened with the first train crossing in May 1889. A special banquet was held for guests on a large pontoon off Dangar Island. The guest list included Sir Henry Parkes who acclaimed the bridge as a major stimulus to Federation. The bridge was a major achievement of its time, being the deepest structure in the world, one of its piers reaching a **depth of 162 feet before resting on solid rock. The bridge needed strengthening in 1927 and then during the 1930's** cracks developed in one of the piers, and it became necessary to replace the whole structure. A new bridge was constructed and opened in 1946, being positioned 60 metres west, or upstream, of the original bridge. Upon completion of the new bridge, the old bridge was removed, however the sandstone capped piers still remain.




Hawkesbury River Rail Bridge, opening ceremony 1 May 1889

Warship Graveyard:

Opposite Milson Island lay the remains of the HMAS Parramatta beneath Cascade Gully. Built in Scotland and launched in 1910, the Parramatta was an advanced River Class torpedo boat destroyer of 700 tons and was the **Australian Navy's first warship. During WW1 she was on active duty in the Atlantic, Indian and Pacific Oceans as** well as the Adriatic, Coral and Mediterranean Seas. While patrolling Port Said and Malta in February 1917 she became the first Australian vessel to sink a U-boat. After the war, she was used as a training vessel in Australian waters. In 1928, she was surplus to the Navy's requirements, and her hull was used to convey construction materials up the Hawkesbury river to build new hospitals on Milson and Peat Islands in 1934. She then became stranded on a sandbank at Cascade Gully. Unsuccessful attempts were made to salvage her hull in the 1950's and again in 1963. Then the bow and stern sections were removed and these now feature as memorials at a riverside park in Parramatta and at Sydney's Garden Island Naval Dockyard.

Glenno's Tips

Did you know that old computer bags make great cooler bags to take your food, drinks or ice down to your boat. They are very well insulated and keep things cool for a long time and are easy to carry.

Vicki and I use vacuum storage bags to store linen and blankets and warm clothes during summer which shrink to a third of normal size therefore taking up a lot less room.

One of the handiest products to keep on your boat are zip up plastic bags. They are not only good for keeping food fresh, they are also great for putting food waste such as used paper plates, used serviettes etc in before putting them in rubbish bags. There will be no smell.

A quick no mess way to have a great dinner is to wrap and seal a meat roast or chicken in "five" layers of tin foil along with veges of your choice also in "five" layers of tin foil. Put them on the barbie turning them every 15-20mins. It will take a shorter time than in an oven as they are in contact with direct heat. After approximately 50 mins take the veges off the direct heat and place them on top of the meat and cook for a further 20mins. This is a "boat hangi". You will now have a meal that allows you to converse with your guests while your dinner is being cooked and the taste is nearly as good as a traditional hangi.
