# Treasurer's Report 2013

I table for this Annual General Meeting a report of the Club's financial position for the year ended 30<sup>th</sup> September 2013, in the form of financial statements -

- Bank Reconciliation Statement;
- Bank Account Statement;
- Income and Expenditure Statement;
- Balance Sheet.

In summary, I highlight the following -

- Cash in the bank at balance date is \$ 10,358.31 (a decrease of \$ 1,205.10 over last year's balance date of \$ 11.563.41)
- Total income for the year of \$ 10,211.10 (a decrease of \$ 629.85 over last year's income of \$ 10,840.95) The income was made up mainly of Membership fees \$5,013; Club Raffles, \$2,380.10 (Glen & Vicki) & Club Functions \$1,716.00.
- Total expenditure for the year was \$ 11,416.20 (an increase of \$ 3484.17 on last year's expenditure of \$7,932.03) the increase mainly due to the new Spencer mooring \$1685.00 also and we have had significant increase in printing & stationary (+629) and items produced for non-sale (+695)

The Club's trading in its Events & Raffles produced a gross trading profit of \$ 405.48. The Hungi event was completely subsidized by the club which dropped profit down by approx 50%

Jo Calleja, Treasurer, BWMYC, 20th October, 2013.

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Recently four of our club members, Paul and myself and Melissa and Fleur, had the opportunity of a lifetime by taking on official roles at the International Fleet Naval Review/Tall Ships Festival in Sydney on the 2<sup>nd</sup> to the 6<sup>th</sup> of October. Sixteen Tall Ships and 45 Naval Warships from around the world came into Sydney Harbour to celebrate 100 years since the **Australian Navy's historic cruise into Sydney in October 1913. A client/friend of Fleur's sent out** a distress call desperately needing people with boating skills to assist as senior liaison officers to the 16 Tall Ships that were arriving from all corners of the world.

Mel and Fleur received the enviable allocation to the "Lady Nelson", one of the smaller but beautiful tall ships from Hobart, with the friendliest crew, and Paul was issued to the actual "Bark Endeavour" itself. The role of liaison officer entailed at first being ambassador to Sydney for all the boats and their crews and then other more mundane things like coordinating sullage, fuel and medical needs etc. The downside to this was having to be on deck with the crews before 7 am before they sailed every day to fulfil their needs, but the real positive was having access to all of the Tall Ships fleet to explore the ships and getting to meet their captains and crews, most days culminating in "shouting" rounds of drinks with the crews in the Pyrmont Bridge Hotel every afternoon. Lots of good company, camaraderie and good friendships were made.

Accommodation in Darling Harbour was at a premium for the event, but by booking early, Mel and Fleur managed to score a lovely apartment in Cockle Bay. Paul, meanwhile, entered into lengthy negotiations with the event coordinator and struck a deal for free berthing and fuel for our boat "Voodoo" in exchange for taking on the role of press boat for the event. Paul and our son Eddy ran "Voodoo" down to Sydney on Tuesday morning, having an uneventful run, except for masses of whales, 40 in total, and arrived in Cockle Bay to be tied up next to the South Steyne, arguably the most premium berth in Sydney.

An early start on Thursday saw myself and Paul, along with 3 cameramen from the NSW Maritime Museum, head out the heads on "Voodoo" at 6 am to meet the Tall Ships as they arrived off Sydney. With a 2 metre swell in full flow, Paul still says it was the beginning of the hardest 8 hours he's done in a long time. Coordinating over radio with the Captains to run past their ships, which were doing about 10 knots, with cameramen yelling instructions so as they can get the "best shots" and then having to turn behind the ships and accelerating hard, up to 25 knots, to catch them again to take more of the "best shots". Paul finally called it quits at about 9 am when he announced we were 15 nautical miles off Cronulla and that it was time to head back. A good thing too, as we were instructed to return to Watson's Bay to collect 2 more officials from AUSTA. Just as we were picking them up from the wharf, the predicted southerly hit, bringing 25-30 knot winds, just to add to the mayhem.

























































Back at 10.30 Paul blasted "Voodoo" back out of the heads again to meet the Fleet as they assembled and headed in. An amazing sight met us as 16 Tall Ships in full sail appeared out of the mist and gloom. Just then a hail storm hit and the sky took on a bronze/sepia colour which added perfectly to the aura of the Fleet. Being the official press boat we were allowed in amongst the Fleet, so "Voodoo" weaved her way between the ships with cameramen clicking away as fast as they could whilst hanging onto the swim platform, still vying for the "best shot". Because of the deteriorating weather the police finally came alongside and warned us off. The camera guys wanted Paul to ignore them, but after the third visit and the police person using the "f" word, we took heed and headed up the Harbour to photograph the Fleet as they came past Bradley's Head, finally settling off Blues Point to capture the ships under the Bridge with the Opera House as the backdrop. Another amazing thing happened as well. Floating just off Luna Park was a strange shape; speculation amongst us was it was dolphins, but Paul picked it from his experiences with boating in WA, as being a seal. We guietly motored over to it and, lo and behold, there it was, an 8 ft black sea lion, happily just sunning himself on the surface. So, is Sydney Harbour cleaning up? There was the proof. Another hour of photographing and the cameramen were done, returning to our berth around 2 pm.

On Friday, "Voodoo" again departed Cockle Bay, this time with Mel and Fleur on board, to photograph the naval warships arrival, 46 in total. We spent a beautiful day floating amongst these spiky angular beasts, photographing them as they docked and moored alongside. An interesting sight was to see the Japanese ship tied up, with the Rising Sun at full mast, proudly flying over Garden Island. A leisurely motor home had us back in Cockle Bay around 3, and at 5 again in the Pyrmont Bridge Hotel.

Dinners were spent in the many restaurants in Darling Harbour every night. Saturday we helped out with the Tall Ships in harbour, as it was the Open Day for the public. All of us concluded the day with pizzas on the wharf as we watched the fireworks, with Mel and Fleur staying over the night on "Voodoo", with us. Our official boat duties were now over, so as Sunday dawned as another glorious day, we stocked up on supplies and, along with some other friends, we headed out for a perfect day on the Harbour.

Monday saw a quick blast back to Berowra. Leaving under the Harbour Bridge at 9 am we were at Twin Beaches at 10.30 – only 1 whale this trip. We met up with the club/gang rafted up at Joe Craft's Bay for lunch. The perfect end to a glorious, if busy, memorable adventure.
